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INTRODUCTION TO THE DAY

James tells us to stop showing favoritism in the assembly, treating the rich visitor with more honor than the poor one. Jesus himself seems to show partiality in his first response to the Syrophoenician woman in today's gospel. Was he testing her faith in saying Gentiles don't deserve the goods meant for God's children? Or was he speaking out of his human worldview, but transcended those limits when she took him by surprise with her reply? Either way, the story tells us that God shows no partiality. Everyone who brings a need to Jesus is received with equal honor as a child and heir.

SECOND READING

James 1:17-27

My siblings, do you with your acts of favoritism really believe in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ? For if a person with gold rings and in fine clothes comes into your assembly, and if a poor person in dirty clothes also comes in, and if you take notice of the one wearing the fine clothes and say, "Have a seat here, please," while to the one who is poor you say, "Stand there," or, "Sit at my feet," have you not made distinctions among yourselves, and become judges with evil thoughts? Listen, my beloved siblings. Has not God chosen the poor in the world to be rich in faith and to be heirs of the kingdom that God has promised to those who love the Lord? But you have dishonored the poor. Is it not the rich who oppress you? Is it not they who drag you into court? Is it not they who blaspheme the excellent name that was invoked over you?

Faithful Christians do not show partiality to the rich and powerful of the world, especially at the expense of the poor and weak. Likewise, faith does not pay mere lip service to God's will. Instead, a living Christian faith expresses itself in acts of compassion and mercy for those in need.

You do well if you really fulfill the royal law according to the scripture, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." But if you show partiality, you commit sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become accountable for all of it. For the one who said, "You shall not commit adultery," also said, "You shall not murder." Now if you do not commit adultery but if you murder, you have become a transgressor of the law. So speak and so act as those who are to be judged by the law of liberty. For judgment will be without mercy to anyone who has shown no mercy; mercy triumphs over judgment.

What good is it, my siblings, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.

GOSPEL READING

Mark 7:24-37

The Holy Gospel according to Mark, the 7th chapter. Glory to you, O Lord.

[Jesus] set out and went away to the region of Tyre. He entered a house and did not want anyone to know he was there. Yet he could not escape notice ,but a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit immediately heard about him, and she came and bowed down at his feet. Now the woman was a Gentile, of Syrophoenician origin. She begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. He said to her, "Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." But she answered him, "Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs." Then he said to her, "For saying that, you may go—the demon has left your daughter." So she went home, found the child lying on the bed, and the demon gone.

Then he returned from the region of Tyre, and went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, in the region of the Decapolis. They brought to him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they begged him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, and put his fingers into his ears, and he spat and touched his tongue. Then looking up to heaven, he sighed and said to him, "Ephphatha," that is, "Be opened." And immediately his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly. Then Jesus ordered them to tell no one; but the more he ordered them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. They were astounded beyond measure, saying, "He has done everything well; he even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak."

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

SACREMENT OF HOLY BAPTISM

God's love and salvation in Jesus can seem mysterious and cosmically far away, so we give thanks for the sacrament of baptism, which pulls these big promises down into the world. Here, God's sacred time comes to play with our human time. Baptism claims us by name and entangles every witness in the good news of God's never ending "yes!"

Baptism also marks our identity as followers of Jesus Christ and unites us to his life, death, and resurrection. When we are baptized in Christ we are marked with the sign of the cross, and in that blessing Jesus' story becomes our story: Suffering may find us but it will not conquer us. Death will greet us, but it will not ultimately claim us.

Iris will not remember this day, so it is our job to remember for her and with her as she grows, to be reflections of God's love in her life and to help her live into her identity as child of God. Though this responsibility is given to our entire congregation and the family and friends who walk with her, Aaron and Elyssa, it is your role as parents to be the primary reflections of God's love for Iris, and to guide her in her faith.

Elyssa and Aaron, called by the Holy Spirit, and trusting in the love and grace of God, do you desire Iris to be baptized into Christ?" If so, respond: "We do."

In Christian love you have presented Iris to the waters of baptism, and you are therefore entrusted with the following

responsibilities:

- To live with her among God's faithful people in a community of faith,
- To bring her to the word of God and share in the holy supper,
- ❖ To teach her the Lord's Prayer, the Creed, and the Ten Commandments,
- ❖ To place in her hands the holy scriptures, and to nurture her in faith, so that she may learn to trust God, proclaim Christ through word and deed, and, following in the way of the prophets and Jesus, care for others and the world God made, and work for justice and peace.

Do you as parents promise to support Iris as she grows in Christian faith and life? If so answer, "Yes, and I ask God to help and guide me."

This is no small task. You have therefore entrusted godparents to help you and to be a special sign of God's love in Iris' life.

As godparents, do you promise to encourage and support Aaron and Elyssa in the promises they have made? Do you promise to pray for Iris, to nurture her in her faith journey and to be an example of how to live in response to God's grace? If so, answer "Yes, and I ask God to help and guide me."

The world will waste no time telling Iris lies about power, worth, and love. And so we come together this day to speak God's truth about these things, to stand with this beloved sister now and as she grows, and to stand against all that might tear her down. So we ask:

People of God, do you renounce evil and all forces that defy God? **We renounce them.**

Do you renounce the powers of this world that rebel against God? **We renounce them.**

Do you renounce the ways of sin that draw you away from God and neighbor: selfishness and greed, oppression and violence, discrimination and injustice, and everything that leads to hatred and death? **We renounce them.**

Do you believe in God the Creator, who gives birth to life and creation?

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Beloved of God, and God's holy presence?

I believe in Jesus Christ,
God's only Son, our Lord,
who was conceived by the Holy Spirit,
born of the virgin Mary,
suffered under Pontius Pilate,
was crucified, died, and was buried;
he descended to the dead.
On the third day he rose again;
he ascended into heaven,
he is seated at the right hand of the Father,
and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit? I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.

This is ordinary water made extraordinary by the sacred stories of scripture it carries. For in the beginning God's Spirit moved over the waters and by God's Word the world was created, calling forth life in which God took delight. In

the wilderness, God provided water for Hagar and Ishmael and promised them a new life. God shepherded a people across the waters of the Reed Sea and into a place of promise. In the vision of waters rolling down from mountains held by the prophets, God proclaimed restoration and health to humanity and the whole of the cosmos. In the river Jordan, Jesus was baptized by John and anointed with the Holy Spirit. By baptism into Jesus' life, death, and resurrection, God sets us free from the power of sin and death and raises us to live as liberated people of faith. These waters wash us with the love of God and hold the stories of our spiritual family, which Iris now enters into.

Iris Ann, I baptize you in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, Mother of us all. Amen.

God of heaven and earth, sustain your beloved child, Iris, with the gift of your Holy Spirit:

The spirit of wisdom and understanding,

The spirit of counsel and might

The spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord,

The spirit of joy in your presence, both now and forever.

The gift of baptism does not ensure a life free from pain and struggle, but it does promise us the presence of God and the love of community to surround you. Hear these words of promise and encouragement in the following poem, "Beloved is where we begin" by Jan Richardson:

If you would enter into the wilderness, do not begin without a blessing.

Do not leave without hearing who you are:

Beloved, named by the One who has traveled this path before you.

Do not go without letting it echo in your ears, and if you find it is hard to let it into your heart, do not despair.

That is what this journey is for.

I cannot promise this blessing will free you from danger, from fear, from hunger or thirst, from the scorching of sun or the fall of the night.

But I can tell you that on this path there will be help. I can tell you that on this way there will be rest.

I can tell you that you will know the strange graces that come to our aid only on a road such as this, that fly to meet us bearing comfort and strength, that come alongside us for no other cause than to lean themselves toward our ear and with their curious insistence whisper our name:

Beloved. Beloved.

With joy and thanksgiving, we welcome you into the Lord's family. We receive you as a beloved child of God and a fellow member of the body of Christ. We promise to love, encourage and support you; to share the good news of the Gospel with you and to help you know and follow Christ as we work together in the kingdom of God.

Let us now welcome Iris into our family of faith!
