
### Be Idle and Be Blessed

~Pastor Ali Ferine

The late Mary Oliver is among the most celebrated modern American poets; her many accolades include the Pulitzer Prize and National Book Award. Her simplistic, nature-inspired poetry has captured the wonder of readers from all ages and after her death in 2019, *The New Yorker* called her, "one of the most beloved poets of her generation."

Now that summer is upon us, the world that Mary Oliver wrote so eloquently of feels available to us. Take into consideration her poem, "Praying"

It doesn't have to be
the blue iris, it could be
weeds in a vacant lot, or a few
small stones; just
pay attention, then patch
a few words together and don't try
to make them elaborate, this isn't
a contest but the doorway
into thanks, and a silence in which
another voice may speak.



"O LORD, how manifold are your works! In wisdom you have made them all; The earth is full of your creatures." (Ps 104:24)



At the dawning of summer I often read my favorite Mary Oliver poem, *The Summer Day*, which ends with the famous lines, "Tell me, what is it you plan to do with your one wild and precious life?" It is tempting to recite them on every "Congratulations" card for the mass of recent college and high school graduates I know, and yet the point of her poem is not to suggest that we should spend our "one wild and precious life" increasing productivity, chasing after success, or hustling in grind culture. The answer to her question is found at the opening of her poem: "I don't know what prayer is. I do know how to pay attention, how to fall down into the grass, how to kneel down in the grass, how to be idle and blessed...tell me, what else should I have done?" She summons her readers into a slow and quiet pace to find the wealth of beauty and blessing in what **God** has created, not in what we can produce.

"Be idle and be blessed." What an invocation for these summer months! Use this season to relax into the bounty of God's love made known through the gift of creation. I often tell the cabin-goers who confess their lack of church attendance during the summer months that "summer is a sanctuary in and of itself" and I believe that whole-heartedly... just as I believe that gathering in community around God's Word and Sacrament gives us the perspective we need in order to fully recognize the blessing of the sunset, to better hear the song that lies within the lapping of the lakeshore, to wholly receive the wisdom of the rustling pines.

This summer our pace as a faith community will shift, and though we are certainly busy with construction and building projects, serving and caring for our community, and dreaming and planning for the year ahead, perhaps with fewer meetings and programs filling our calendars we can sink a little more deeply into worship and fellowship, trusting that God is still meeting us in the small quiet moments.

Blessed summer, dear ones! May you find time to be "Idle and blessed" -- and because we know rest has become a privilege not afforded by all, may Mary Oliver's words be for us God's call to build a better world, a world in which everyone can rest and delight in their "wild and precious" life.

With joy we lift up St. Michael's members who received the Sacrament of Holy Baptism: Theodore Emil Cihacek was baptized on May 14.




### In Love

## **Guatemala Partnership**

The trip to visit our partner congregation is a long one. First, a day of air travel into Central America then a two-day drive across Guatemala before you reach your destination. You *feel* the distance you have covered, you *feel* how small a human is on the scale of this earth.

As we traveled, we talked. You can cover a lot of verbal distance in 14 hours in the backseat of a pickup truck. In conversation after conversation with our Guatemalan friends, we found similarities in our situations, but we also found commonality in our responses of "But, what difference can I really make?"

- The effects of climate change being seen in both our countries, the devastation of the land in Guatemala by Palm Oil plantations driven by the companies supplying products to the United States.
- Corruption in government, abuse of power for personal gain, regulations adding hurdles to voter participation.
- The mismatch between the number of jobs and the number of those seeking them and Immigration policies counterintuitive to solving the mismatch.
- The inability to provide clean water, affordable utilities, and safe sanitation across our countries.
- The threat of violence; gun violence, personal violence, police violence, military violence.

All the issues we discussed felt too large to tackle; too large especially for someone just reminded of how small they felt in this world. Hopelessness began to set in and we talked about that too. We also talked about faith; that we had faith in a God of abundant love. I wasn't sure at the time why, but that helped me keep my feelings of hopelessness from spiraling into despair.

Several weeks have gone by and I keep revisiting those conversations and the feelings they evoked. I believe that within the safety of God's love we are free to feel small or alone or hopeless. But even though we may *feel* hopeless, we are not without hope. I believe God's love gives us hope. An abundant love encompasses everyone and everything without limits; a limitless love gives me freedom to hope.

St. Michael's as a congregation (not including individual families who have made contributions):

has given gifts totaling \$700

allowing for giveness of medical debt in the amount of \$57,788  $\,$ 

with 92 families having medical debt forgiven

As part of The Alliance, the congregation has cumulatively had \$49 million forgiven for 50,000 families.



### Summer Patio Series - Kick off on June 4!

Join the St. Michael's women for the Summer Patio Series, a time for small group connection and conversation! For five sessions this summer, small groups will read *The Defiant Middle* by Kaya Oakes.



Women are expected to be many things. They should be young enough, but not too young; old enough, but not too old; creative, but not crazy; passionate, but not angry. They should be fertile and feminine and self-reliant, not barren or butch or solitary. Women, in other words, are caught between social expectations and a much more complicated reality.

In *The Defiant Middle*, Kaya Oakes draws on the wisdom of women mystics and explores how transitional eras or living in marginalized female identities can be both spiritually challenging and wonderfully freeing, ultimately resulting in a reinvented way of seeing the world and changing it. "Change, after all," Oakes writes, "always comes from the margins."

It's a great partnership for both the Saints and the Twins.





# **Co-Pastor Update**

A congregation meeting and ballot vote was held on May 7 with two motions calling Pastor Ali and Pastor Brad as co-pastors; the motions passed!

Thank you to the call committee, personnel committee, and council for their hard work.

# **Property Team Update**

Garrison Keillor would start his monolog by saying "it's been a quiet week in lake Woebegone." He then proceeded to talk for half an hour or more about everything that had happened that week. I guess you could say it's been a quiet month at Saint Michael's!

- Of course the big news is that work on the exterior sanctuary walls has begun and should be completed by the end of June. This work will address the water infiltration problem with the design of the brick walls and roof. It also adds some insulation to a previously uninsulated wall. This will not only save energy but make the sanctuary more comfortable in both summer and winter.
- The new dampers that we ordered to replace the non-functioning dampers in the sanctuary air handler have arrived and are in the process of being installed in the ductwork. These dampers plus the new controls we put in earlier this year will allow us to bring fresh air into the sanctuary in order to cool it down for activities the following day. This is essentially free air conditioning in what is otherwise an unconditioned space.
- Thanks to the generous donation of an anonymous church member, we were able to order the new air conditioning system for Fellowship Hall. This new system is a state-of-the-art heat pump that operates at a much higher efficiency than the previous failing air conditioner ever did. It is also capable of running in reverse during the heating season to extract heat from the outdoor air, concentrate it and deliver it to Fellowship Hall rather than using the natural gas heater (that will be left in place as a backup unit). This system will allow us to heat Fellowship Hall with 100%electricity in keeping with Minnesota's Climate Response goals of eliminating carbon fuels like natural gas by the year 2040. This new system should be operational by the time this newsletter is published.
- The sanctuary wall project involves the removal of the copper-clad decorative fins from the exterior wall. A group of property committee volunteers removed the copper from these fins and brought it to a scrapyard. This generated \$4,476.65 in revenue which will go to help pay for the wall project.

In addition to this list, all of the usual maintenance activities have been going on including sump pump repairs, pothole patching, spring clean up of storage areas, repairs to balcony stairway, tree and bush trimming, general yard clean up and work on the pollinator garden.

We give thanks to God for a congregation that understands the need to take care of our church home and so generously donates their time and talents to its ongoing maintenance requirements.


And as Garrison Keillor would end his show, I'll say "that's the news from Saint Michael's where the women are strong, the men are good-looking, and all of the children are above average."
