
Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do

This reading from the book of Zephaniah comes from the conclusion of the book and prophesies joy for Judah and Jerusalem. Judgment has led to repentance, and God's salvation and restoration is at hand.

Despite being in prison, Paul is remarkably upbeat as he writes this letter. Here, he urges his friends in Philippi to trust God with all their worries and concerns with the hope that they will experience God's joy and peace. not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Luke 3:7-18

The Holy Gospel according to Luke, the 3rd chapter.

Glory to you, O Lord.

John said to the crowds that came out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruits worthy of repentance. Do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to

Abraham. Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire."

And the crowds asked him, "What then should we do?" In reply he said to them, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise." Even tax collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, "Teacher, what should we do?" He said to them, "Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you." Soldiers also asked him, "And we, what should we do?" He said to them, "Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages."

As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

So, with many other exhortations, he proclaimed the good news to the people.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.


Communion will be distributed in the pews. If you did not receive elements upon entering the sanctuary an usher can provide them to you.

WORSHIP NOTES

O Antiphons

The O Antiphons originated as a part of the vespers service in the ancient church. There is mention of them in the writings of Boethuis (c. 480-524). By the 8th c. they were a ritual part of the advent liturgical practice of the Roman church. Each of the antiphons highlights a title for the Messiah: O Wisdom, O Adonai, O flower of Jesse, O key of David, O Radiant dawn, O King of the nations, O Emmanuel. The Benedictine monks arranged these antiphons with a purpose. If one starts with the last title and takes the first letter of each one Emmanuel, Rex, Oriens, Clavis, Radix, Adonai, Sapientia - the Latin words ero cras are formed, meaning, Tomorrow, I will come. These antiphons became the basis for our great advent hymn, "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel."
