Therefore he shall give them up until the time when she who is in labor has brought forth; then the rest of his kindred shall return to the people of Israel.

And he shall stand and feed his flock in the strength of the Lord,

in the majesty of the name of the Lord his God.

And they shall live secure, for now he shall be great to the ends of the earth;

and he shall be the one of peace.

SECOND READING

Hebrews 10:5-9

Consequently, when Christ came into the world, he said, "Sacrifices and offerings you have not desired, but a body you have prepared for me; in burnt offerings and sin offerings


you have taken no pleasure.

Then I said, 'See, God, I have come to do your will, O God' (in the scroll of the book it is written of me)." When he said above, "You have neither desired nor taken pleasure in sacrifices and offerings and burnt offerings and sin offerings" (these are offered according to the law), then he added, "See, I have come to do your will." He abolishes the first in order to establish the second.

The author of Hebrews uses the image of religious sacrifice to convey the significance of Christ's coming.

WORSHIP NOTES

O Antiphons

The O Antiphons originated as a part of the vespers service in the ancient church. There is mention of them in the writings of Boethuis (c. 480-524). By the 8th c. they were a ritual part of the advent liturgical practice of the Roman church. Each of the antiphons highlights a title for the Messiah: O Wisdom, O Adonai, O flower of Jesse, O key of David, O Radiant dawn, O King of the nations, O Emmanuel. The Benedictine monks arranged these antiphons with a purpose. If one starts with the last title and takes the first letter of each one Emmanuel, Rex, Oriens, Clavis, Radix, Adonai, Sapientia - the Latin words ero cras are formed, meaning, Tomorrow, I will come. These antiphons became the basis for our great advent hymn, "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel."
