CHILDREN'S SERMON

FIRST READING

The Lord said to Moses, "Go down at once! Your people, whom you brought up out of the land of Egypt, have acted perversely; they have been quick to turn aside from the way that I commanded them; they have cast for themselves an image of a calf, and have worshiped it and sacrificed to it, and said, 'These are your gods, O Israel, who brought you up out of the land of Egypt!' " The Lord said to Moses, "I have seen this people, how stiff-necked they are. Now let me alone, so that my wrath may burn hot against them and I may consume them; and of you I will make a great nation."

But Moses implored the Lord his God, and said, "O Lord, why does your wrath burn hot against your people, whom you brought out of the land of Egypt with great power and with a mighty hand? Why should the Egyptians say, 'It was with evil intent that their god brought them out to kill them in the mountains, and to consume them from the face of the earth'? Turn from your fierce wrath; change your mind and do not bring disaster on your people. 



The word *liturgy* comes from the Greek word for work of the people. We recognize that carrying out worship at St. Michael's takes many hands, hearts, voices, and skills.

Alongside all our choirs, our pastors, music staff, office staff, and communications associate, worship takes the following congregational leadership each week:

- **Ushers**: 2-4 for each service
- Lectors: 1 for each service
- Cantor: often 1 for each service
- Communion Servers: 2 for each service
- Altar Preparation: 1 for set up and clean up, 1 to bake bread each week
- Tellers: 2 to count offering each week
- Altar Flowers: 1 individual or household to provide for altar flowers each week.
